Attached is our Colorado Certified Records Network (CCRN) Guideline which includes who we are, who we are endorsed by, the rigors of our examinations and our training agenda. Part One and Part Four of the training curriculum carries the biggest liability for individuals working in the law enforcement records field and their departments.

All across the country, courts are ordering large fines to be paid by individuals and law enforcement agencies for violations of open records law. Every year, laws become increasingly complex. There is great risk in both releasing a criminal justice record and in denying inspection of a record.
